

# Remembering The Saints

When Paul wrote to the church in Rome, he addressed his letter "To all God's beloved ... who are called to be saints" (Romans 1:7, NRSV). Paul regarded his fellow believers as people who have responded to the good news of Christ by choosing to follow and serve God.

The New Testament emphasizes that Christians are God's beloved — special people set apart to receive his grace and to be his witnesses. All people whose minds and hearts are devoted to God are "called to be saints."

About 700 years after the church began, leaders designated November 1 as All Saints' Day to honor people whose lives reflect Christ dwelling within them. Because of what God has done for us, all Christians can wear the label of saint.

November 2, 1969 is a day that lives powerfully in my memory. On that day, my father died. He had been struggling with cancer of the bladder for six years, and spent the last month of his life in a bed in our home. Those days, and especially that day, were very difficult. My dad was a very good man, and was very playful and tender with me. I felt his loss profoundly, though I really did not speak about it for many years. Through the years, though, I have discovered that my has grief shifted from a sadness about his loss to a profound gratitude for his presence in my life. The worst things are never the last things.



"The worst things are never the last things." Drawing on the power of resurrection, John Claypool spoke those lines often, perhaps most memorably as he described the funeral of Winston Churchill. The former British prime minister had planned his own funeral liturgy. The service was traditional, but at a particular point, Churchill had instructed that Taps would be played by a bugler. Upon hearing that, the congregation entered a solemn mood, only to be surprised by the sounds of "Reveille." Church's final testimony is that even in the wake of difficulty, it's time to get up. As he said in his famous address, "Never give in!"

In November, we will honor this affirming faith. On November 2, we celebrate "All Saints Day," when we remember the lives of those we have lost. While we will feel some sadness when we do, All Saints Day is chiefly a time to give thanks for the gifts these ones leave us. Later in the month, we will mark Christ the King Sunday, sometimes called, Reign of Christ Sunday. It is the last Sunday of the Christian Calendar, the next Sunday being the first Sunday of Advent. Christ the King Sunday marks that through the year, in all the days of our lives, God is alive and working in us. It, too, affirms, that the last thing is never the worst thing, but always leads us into God's ongoing grace. May it be so!

God often works in unexpected ways. Just ask Naaman, the army commander in 2 Kings 5:1-14. Stricken with leprosy, he traveled to Israel seeking healing from the prophet Elisha. Instead of an impressive display or a grand ceremony, Elisha sent word for him to simply wash seven times in the Jordan River.

Naaman was not impressed. "Aren't the rivers of Damascus better than all the waters of Israel?" he asked. Why bathe in a foreign, muddy river when the clean, sparkling rivers of home were far more appealing? It didn't make sense. Yet what seemed absurd became the very path to his healing.

We may not be told to wade into an actual river, but we all face "Jordan moments" in life — times when God calls us to take a step that feels uncomfortable, humbling or completely illogical. It is in those moments that trust and obedience matter most.

Naaman's story reminds us that God's power is not limited by appearances or human reasoning. Sometimes the action that feels least likely to work is the one that opens the door to blessing. When God invites you to take the plunge, step into the water. You may find healing and hope waiting there.



# A Thanksgiving Hymn That Sees God's Hand Everywhere

For a hymn that captures the beauty and gratitude of Thanksgiving, All Things "Bright and Beautiful" is a perfect choice Its lyrics paint vivid pictures — flowers opening in the morning sun, birds singing, golden sunsets, purple-topped mountains and rivers rushing by. It all leads to this joyful reminder: "He gave us eyes to see them, and lips that we might tell: How great is God Almighty, who has made all things well."

The hymn was written by Cecil Frances Alexander (1818–1895), an Irishwoman with a passion for teaching children about God. She wrote many hymns for her Sunday school class, later collected in *Verses for Holy Seasons*.

But her ministry went beyond music — she spent her life serving the poor, comforting the sick, and caring for the grieving. When she passed away, "a great throng" gathered to remember her, honoring both her faith and the beauty she shared with the world.



### Star of David Window Progress




Before Removal
